

Off-grid electricity technologies and infrastructure has increasingly become a part of the energy configuration across the Pacific, helping to address issues of electricity access, energy security and/or energy resilience. Its application and implementation, however, it's highly diverse. In terms of scale, off-grid electricity ranges from small-scale solar lanterns to larger-scale mini-grids serving hundreds of households. Its dissemination has been facilitated through community organizations, non-government organizations, the private sector, government agencies as well as being facilitated through range of different bilateral and multilateral aid initiatives.
